A CC Certificate Helps IIy Nunn Launch a Business

When Casper resident Ily Nunn took a dramatic career leap to strbusiness, she was thrilled that she didn't have to look farther than Casper College for the training she needed.

Starting a private utility locating company wasn't exactly her planned career path; Nunn graduated from the University of Wyoming with a degree in business, imagining herself in banking, human resources, or at an office job.

"I graduated with a bachelor's in business management thinking, 'OK, what will I manage? What will I do?'" she said.

"I'd worked in banking, loved working with people, never guessed I'd be running my own business out and about in my hard hat."

Her husband, an environmental engineer, kept bringing home stories of his frustration on the job when he would be drilling, looking for contamination, and run into an unmarked private utility line. He told Ily that hitting an unmarked gas line was dangerous, and bringing a utility locator from Colorado was expensive. He believed she should use her business degree filling that need.

But she describes herself as having no technical background or experience. What she needed was a crash course in utility locating. As it turns out, Casper College offers a certificate in utility locating partnership with Staking University in Illinois.

The course is partly in the classroom, and the rest is locating utility lines on the Casper College campus. Nunn considers herself a hands-on learner, and she was glad to have the opportunity to learn in a class, rather than online. She was intimidated at first because of her lack of experience, "but I put on my student hat and was really, really focused," she said.

"I was pleasantly surprised at how much fun I had," was her conclusion. And she passed the test to become certified. The utility locator certificate is one of five certification programs at Casper College in the building trades and construction area. The others are architectural graphics and design, construction technology, electrical apprentice, engineering technology and design, and mechanical graphics and design.

Nunn said, "It was a huge investment in me as a person. While I loved the outdoors and this business idea, I never realized I could grasp something like that; I realized I could do this. It was absolutely a good investment." She was able to earn back the cost of the course with about a half day's work once her business got going.


She got a boost for the business in 2016 when she was one of three chosen for the Casper Start-Up Challenge, a grant and assistance program of the University of Wyoming WTBC, Wyoming Technology Business Center. Nunn was able to buy more equipment and take advanced training.


Now she has more work than she can handle throughout Wyoming and in Utah, Idaho, Colorado, and Kansas. This may be the year she hires another person. And she will immediately send that employee to Casper College for the certification program that worked so well for her.




Enrollment for 2018-19 Academic Year






Academic Degrees and Certificates Awarded

Hiring Casper College Grads Works for Stotz

Hiring Casper College graduates is a way of life at Stotz Equipment in Evansville, Wyoming.

"We know we hit a home run if we hire someone who came from Casper College, especially the ag and diesel programs," said Stotz Store Manager John Hornecker, (AS, '01), himself a CC graduate. Evansville and Riverton offices of Stotz Equipment could host a Casper College reunion on any given day with the number of graduates or attendees of college programs at work. Nine CC alumni work in Evansville and four in Riverton, said Hornecker.

Stotz is the John Deere dealership in Wyoming, part of a company with 25 stores in eight western states. The company brings in CC students as interns to get real work experience, pays for their tools and some education costs if new hires stay with the company four years, and supports the college livestock judging program, as well as Natrona

Service Manager Shad Leggett, a CC graduate, (Cert., '03), is convinced that hiring people with a college education pays off in employees " ... with a deeper education, better English, math and speaking abilities who conduct themselves well with customers.

Coulter Anderson (AAS, Cert., '19) "They are heads and shoulders above other employees because they can fix equipment and then explain to the customer what they did," said Leggett.

> The CC students in the diesel and agriculture programs are obvious fits for a business that sells and services John Deere farm, oil field, oil and gas pipeline reclamation, and golf course maintenance equipment. But at the Evansville store, Heather Loraas uses

her associate in agriculture communications and her University of Wyoming degree in agriculture communications as an administrative assistant who greets the public and helps with sales contracts.

Farm equipment salesman Zac Long studied ag business at CC while steer wrestling on the rodeo team. He says the communication and computer skills he learned help him every day on the job.

Coulter Anderson finished up his internship at Stotz and graduated in December 2019 with an Associate of Applied Science degree in diesel power technology; then, he started a full-time job at Stotz the next Monday. He completed the diesel power tech program at Casper College and worked part time at Stotz for a year after he finished his Army commitment. He said that the trades path in college almost always guarantees someone will get a job in his or her field. For him, what he learned in science classes, especially in physics, is valuable on the job almost every day.

As satisfied as Anderson is with landing a job with good pay and benefits upon graduation, it may be that Hornecker, his boss, is even happier with the Casper College partnership. He likes hiring people who are "homegrown Wyomingites with a good work ethic. We have tried to pay headhunters to get MBA's who don't perform as well" in the management positions as the Wyoming people promoted from within, he





Rodeo Arena Becomes Reality

Thanks to generous donations to the Casper College Foundation, the Casper College Rodeo team finally has a place to call home: the newly built arena at the Casper College Ranch.

The Ranch, which was purchased in 2014, held the promise of providing a location where a much-needed indoor arena for the college's rodeo athletes could be built. The arena would allow team members a place to practice, and just as important, provide a place where they could keep their horses.

For many years Casper College students had been able to keep their horses at the Central Wyoming Fairgrounds. That changed, however, when the fairgrounds was no longer able to offer that service due to federal regulations.

With that change, students had to arrange housing for their horses with local ranchers. This also created a hardship for student athletes, because they had to haul their horses to and from The Arena at the fairgrounds. Hauling was time-consuming and proved to be costly in gas and wear and tear on vehicles. In addition, it meant that students had to spend part of their valuable training time to time on the road, hauling their horses back and forth.

The change at the fairgrounds also meant that rough stock, which had been able to stay on the fairgrounds, also had to be hauled back and forth each day for practice. The long and arduous process of hauling livestock back and forth fell on the coaches. This made for long days for both coaches and students.

Now, the long-awaited rodeo arena at the Casper College Ranch has been realized. The spacious facility allows students to practice for every rodeo event they compete in. The nearby stalls enable students to easily walk their horse to the arena for practice. The closeness of the facility to the Casper College campus also provides the students with more time and opportunity to take care of and enjoy their horses.

The new facility provides all the amenities needed for team members to practice out of the elements in a warm and safe environment. The Casper College Rodeo team now has a place it can truly call "home."
