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Letter from the President

In our 2018-2019 annual report, I mentioned the importance of being in equilibrium with change, but little did I know how important that statement would be in 2020. Much like the rest of the world, Casper College began the year as any other year, a year chock full of opportunities.

On March 2, I shared a communication with our campus from our state public health officer that explained COVID-19 for the first time and the precautions we should take to protect ourselves from it. At the time, there hadn't been a case of COVID-19 identified in Wyoming, yet it was clear it wouldn't be long until it reached us.

On March 12, the college announced that spring break would be extended to allow instructors and students the time to shift to remote instruction as a precaution against COVID-19. It was only meant to last for a short time, but a statewide public health order was later announced March 19 that closed many public spaces, including college campuses. It was clear to us that we'd finish the semester remotely.

Remote learning has been part of our educational offering for many years, and it was no surprise that the college handled the challenge. Graduation became the focal point, and we were determined to keep those planning to graduate on course. It was a proud moment for me and all of us at Casper College to recognize graduates at a special online graduation event and capstone to a unique point in our history.

Coming out of the shutdown, we were anticipating a 26% decline in enrollment for the fall. It became imperative to us to come forward with a campus reopening plan that could assure students they could continue to receive the same quality educational experience. By the first day of fall classes, we achieved the same headcount as the prior year and slightly above last year in credit hours, a feat not many colleges in the country could claim for themselves.

There was something very special about seeing students return to campus on Aug. 24. Perhaps it is that same feeling I get each year: their positive outlook and excitement for what lies ahead are truly engaging. Yet, this year was a little different because I knew how hard everyone worked to make a return to campus possible. This isn't to say that there wasn't a lot of work ahead but seeing students on campus was a special milestone for all of us here.

2020 is an important year for Casper College. The fall semester marked the college's 75th anniversary. Casper College was the state's first junior college that you'll learn a little more about in this annual report.

Casper College continued progress on every front this year despite its challenges. 2020 was the inaugural season for men's and women's soccer, and nearly 70 athletes and coaches are more than ready for their season to begin spring 2021. The final details to the roping arena were completed, major maintenance tasks all remained on schedule, and we absorbed a 10% budget reduction from the state — all of this in light of the challenges of a global pandemic.

Our progress and achievements were due to the dedication of instructors and staff at the college, some 400 people, but also to a very supportive community. Thank you.



Soccer Debuts in 2020

In June 2019, Kim Byrd, vice president for student services at Casper College, announced that Casper College would have both men's and women's NJCAA soccer teams ready to compete beginning in fall 2020. Both Casper teams would play their home games at the Casper Community Soccer Complex.

In January, the college hired two men with experience head coaching soccer at the NJCAA level: Ben McArthur for the men and Ammon Bennett for the women. Thanks to the COVID-19 pandemic that decimated sports schedules at all levels, the fall season saw no official soccer games played except for a few scrimmages. Both teams are looking eagerly to spring 2021 to begin actual play.

Soccer came to Casper College with college President Darren Divine wanting to grow enrollment. Soccer was a reasonable solution because, as Byrd put it, "Adding athletic teams is one of the easiest and fastest ways to grow enrollment." Several factors led to the decision to add soccer to the roster of athletic teams the college already had.

The biggest reason that soccer was a reasonable solution was the increase in enrollment by a minimum of 48 students. There would also be plenty of teams to compete against in Region IX. Wyoming high schools could provide players to recruit into the college ranks as there are 14 4A and 10 3A schools with soccer teams. Finally, the Casper community's interest in the sport was strong, and the Casper Youth Soccer program was well established. "The Casper Soccer Club in town is excited to have college players in their midst," noted Paul Marble, Casper College athletic director.

Both teams help the college with expenses by increasing the number of students living in the Residence Hall. Additional students also increase the college's overall full-time enrollment numbers, which results in an "… increase in revenue we get from the state based on the number of credits our entire student body is taking," Byrd noted.

Angel Sharman, head volleyball coach, was asked to create a cost-benefit study to see if soccer could be a cost-effective way to grow enrollment at Casper College without increasing expenses. Sharman found that projected revenue would be higher than projected expenses. "When the board of trustees looked at all the facts, it became a 'no brainer' as the college would definitely benefit from the addition of a soccer program," said Byrd.


The future looks bright for Casper College soccer. Both teams, their coaches and the athletic department are excited to begin play in the spring 2021 semester.

"We are committed to creating a championship culture at Casper College in all of our sports. This means we want great people, great students, and great athletes. Yes, in that order and in all aspects of our student athlete's lives," Marble said.

Casper College soccer player Denali Bergquist handles the ball during a fall scrimmage game.


Casper College soccer player Gonzalo Bazan blocks a pass during a fall scrimmage game.

Enrollment for 2019-2020 Academic Year



Wyoming's First Community College Celebrates 75 Years

Knowing what you know today about Casper College, you probably wouldn't believe it if you were told it took a community of courageous individuals to create this gem over 75 years ago. Using the word courage gives you the notion that merely bringing up the idea of establishing a community college in Casper would be faced with adversity, significant challenge, and opposition. That is exactly what our community faced in the beginning. They envisioned education to be more accessible and affordable for everyone, but getting there was a challenge.

The first mention of establishing a community college in Casper dates to 1926. It wasn't an idea that members of the Wyoming Legislature immediately accepted. In fact, the journey for Casper College stretched another 19 years of spirited study and debate before finally becoming law in February 1945. Once the measure passed the Wyoming Legislature and was signed by then Gov. Lester C. Hunt, the Casper community mobilized an incredible effort to begin classes in fall 1945. They feared the measure could be repealed in the next legislative session should the school not be up and running soon after the legislation passed.

Since that time, Casper has continued that same courageous spirit. The college is an incredible success story. Casper College stands as a community, state, and regional pillar of education. It has grown from the small classrooms of Natrona County High School to encompass nearly 200 acres, 28 buildings, and a graduate list reaching into the tens of thousands. Nearly 4,000 students attend the college each year to take advantage of more than 140 degree and certificate options, skills training, high school equivalency, and much more. Students can now continue their studies towards bachelor's, master's and even doctorate degrees locally by continuing with the University of Wyoming at Casper on the Casper College campus.

Students at Casper College gain the advantage of a college experience that stretches from the learning environment to student clubs and activities, to championship athletics teams, to a vibrant culture in the arts and humanities. There are many things the college is known for, but nothing says it better than the smile you see from Casper College alumni as they recount their college experiences. As the college has grown, so has the community that attracts students looking for a "small-town feel with big-city amenities." Casper is known for its wide range of activities, entertainment, and outdoor adventure.

What was missing over 75 years ago was a window into the future and a chance for people to see Casper College for what it is today, including its contributions to the community and individuals who are reaping the benefits of their education.

The college's mission is simple, "Education for a lifetime." That same courage that established Casper College is alive and well today and will continue to shape the college's future and its graduates for a very exciting 75 years ahead.





From Pupil to Teacher of the Year

When Alexis (Banta) Barney began work on her associate degree in elementary education with an area of concentration in creative arts, little did she know that in less than 10 years, she would be named the 2021 Wyoming Teacher of the year.

The desire to teach others was part of Barney's makeup even as a child. "I used to force my younger brother to learn in my very own 'summer school' program as kids. I have always loved being around children — teaching and learning from them," she said.

Barney, who graduated from Saratoga High School in May 2010, came to Casper College after receiving a scholarship offer to be on the Casper College Speech and Debate Team. "I knew I wanted to stay in Wyoming, but after receiving that scholarship, taking a tour, and researching the education program, I knew Casper College was the right fit for me! I love Wyoming, I love Casper, and I love the community feel of Casper College," said Barney.

Casper College proved to be the right spot for Barney. "I am a firm believer in community colleges. I love the small class sizes, the flexibility, and the opportunities to explore by taking classes that might be outside your major. The (low) cost is a huge benefit as well," she said. Because she could complete her bachelor's in elementary education at the University of Wyoming at Casper, located on the Casper College campus, Barney was able to continue to be a part of the college community she had grown to love during her first two years.

Calling her career as an elementary educator "a natural fit," Barney is a fourth- and fifth-grade teacher at Evansville Elementary. This past summer, she was recognized as the District Teacher of the Year for the Natrona County School District No. 1. In September, Barney received the award for the state. "When I heard my name announced, I was so excited! There were butterflies in my stomach, and my heart was about to burst out of my chest!" she exclaimed and added, "It was incredibly emotional. I am so thrilled and proud to represent some of the hardest working, most dedicated people in the country, teachers."

Both Superintendent of Public Instruction, Jillian Balow, and Evansville Elementary Principal Wayne Tuttle had nothing but praise for Barney. "Congratulations to Alexis on being named

Wyoming's 2021 Teacher of the Year," said Balow. "I find that her passion and charisma are contagious — and I'm excited for her to share that with others over the next year. Alexis has the heart, mindset, and drive of an excellent teacher. In this role, she will continue to inspire many as she learns to advocate for excellent teaching and learning." "Alexis is without a doubt one of the finest educators I have worked with in my nearly three decades in education," added Tuttle.
